### Master Plan—Update

Public Intercepts—The Library has conducted multiple public intercepts the past 30 days. The Library has been present at Old Town Plaza, Farmer's markets, Fort Collins Senior Center events, food truck rallies, open streets, Outreach programs, Rist Canyon, Laporte, and many other locations throughout our district.

Strategic Visioning Workshop -- On September 13<sup>th</sup>, the Library hosted a Strategic Visioning Workshop with a total of 53 participants. Focusing on four overreaching themes-- people, place, partnerships, and sustainability; local community leaders and stakeholders participated in hands-on activities and engaging discussions exploring the following:

- The role of the Library in positioning our community for a vibrant future
- The influence of changing community demographics, needs, and development on library service
- How the library can provide the greatest value to the community, and
- Opportunities for powerful collaboration with community partners

Plan Advisory Committee—the Plan Advisory Committee is meeting on October 4<sup>th</sup>. Our consultants, Group 4, are planning to present a summary of what the Library has been hearing from the community through the strategic vision workshop and the public intercepts. Additionally, Group 4 will lead a discussion on the implications for services and spaces, emerging planning principles and framework, and talk about some of the potential strategies for expanding capacity in library facilities. The Library will also share the Top 10 vision boards from the strategic vision workshop.

### COLLECTIONS

Due to the popularity of hoopla, the e-media budget is running over. In the last 12 months, hoopla gained an average of 429 new users a month. Hoopla provides a wide variety of titles that are not duplicated in our other services. In the last 12 months, 54,564 unique titles have been downloaded. To manage the budget so that we can provide access to the extensive hoopla catalog and still provide access to digital titles not available in hoopla, changes have been made to the service.

- Duplicate titles have been suppressed. If we own it in Overdrive or RBDigital, it will not be available to download in hoopla. This will cause users to not have immediate access to the title and have to wait on a holds list.
- The download limit has been changed from 10 to 7 downloads. The majority of users (69%) download 5 or less items, but an average of 28% of users hit the ten download limit. The projection is dropping the limit to 7 will save \$19,410 in the coming year.
- Audiobooks consist of 38% of the total circulation. They are the most expensive per download. The maximum cost of a download has been dropped to \$2.84. The vendor predicts this will save us 8% over the cost this year (about \$36,000).
- It has also been proposed that we eliminate the access to download music. Tova will be working with the vendor to evaluate how many users this will affect and estimate the cost savings.

An email went out to 6,000 hoopla users announcing the download limit change. Tova is gathering feedback and responding to the users. In general, they are happy with the service but disappointed at the change. Several would like to see the limit increased. Several were glad to learn that there were other digital services they could access.

Penguin Random House announced a change to their digital title pricing. They are going to move to metered access. Titles will be available at a lower price for a certain time period or a designated number of checkouts. This change will help the library stretch our digital budget further. It will allow us to purchase access to high demand titles for less money and then purchase fewer copies as demand falls and reduce the wait time for popular materials.

Two new gadgets were launched – ukulele and violin kits. These items were provided by the Outreach Department as part of the summer intern's project.

orchestrated an incredible Kickoff event. In collaboration with Old Town we opened the month celebration with New York Time bestselling author Matt de la Peña.



determination payed off.




their spirits. Some of the teachers stated:

# **OLD TOWN LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS**

OTL began hosting an Intercambio class for customers interested in learning English as a second language twice a week. This class is hosted by La Familia and facilitated by a volunteer. This formal ESL instruction compliments the Thursday evening Conversations in English class, which is also facilitated by a volunteer. These new services, along with OTL's bilingual story time, have collectively expanded Old Town Library's services to English language learners.

Monique's outreach to O'Dea Elementary resulted in our amazing circulation team created 230 new library cards for students. Monique distributed the cards to some really excited O'Dea kids. Eileen and Louise partnered to host a One Planet tour of Old Town Library for City employees. The tour focused on the library as a resource for social sustainability, highlighted the green updates in the 2012 remodel as well as the amazing, important work done by the library's Green Team. The tour proved popular with participants and another tour is scheduled for October.

Old Town Library is partnering with Outreach Fort Collins (OFC) to offer additional support for library staff to de-escalate disruptive behaviors, reduce library suspensions and emergency service calls. Lisa Dunworth, a Behavioral Health Clinician with SummitStone and Outreach Fort Collins, has scheduled hours in an Old Town Library study room on Wednesdays and Fridays. This service also is tasked with increasing OFC staff engagement with homeless individuals in need of services.

We had a record low number of behavior-related incidents at OTL in September, with only ten incidents reported by staff compared to 46 incidents in September 2017. There were 52 incidents reported in August and 54 incidents in July.

Vicky attended a training on Checking Our Biases: Meaningful and Authentic Engagement with Children and Families by Luis Hernandez. It was the most interactive program ever. The sixth annual Be Ready Fair was held this month with about 400 people in attendance. Author Matt de la Pena stopped at Old Town Library for a quick tour.

Digital literacy classes at OTL included Computer Comfort, Tablets and Smartphones, and Word Basics. Nicole and Kristen had their first book club meeting of the year with the Spectrum Club at Poudre High and 23 students! They discussed the graphic novel Spinning by Tillie Walden.

OTL employees sought out continuing education, with Vicky attending the ALSC Institute in Ohio. All five of the library buildings were represented at the Institute training with sessions on diversity and inclusivity. Monique attended Crucial Conversations through the City and Eileen is working through the Leading at the City training throughout the fall.

Nicole hosted about 50 students from Polaris for Hogwarts classes including Defense Against the Dark Arts and Spells, Care of Magical Creatures, and Divination. They learned so many things and had lots of good things to say about their experiences!

September featured the first session of Erin L.'s Build Club, a children's program running on school-out days. Students and their families came together to build with LEGO bricks, create space stations and planets, plus try new engineering challenges. We engineered rocket ships, experimented with marshmallow catapults, and designed paper jets.

#### **Harmony Nonprofit Center**

Three staff members who formerly occupied a portion of the new center have relocated to office space in the main back work area of Harmony, allowing us to repurpose the former interlibrary loan area for a productive use that provides a direct benefit to our District residents.
